The course will be taught from a Business Essentials course packet available at the bookstore. Notices and additional information will be posted on Sakai.

Course Objective and Description: Business Essentials is a first-year course that provides a quick start on a business education. It explores several advanced concepts that few schools address until the senior year and others don't address until graduate school. Among the advanced topics are: (i) entrepreneurship and raising capital; (ii) data analytics; (iii) critical thinking and negotiation; (iv) financial statement analysis; (v) contract law; (vi) the theory of capitalism, (vii) tax policy and (viii) company valuation. Other topics include civility and professional development.

To achieve these objectives, the course strikes a balance between lecture and student involvement. Sakai resources and class handouts present the basics in each subject area. It is very important that everyone read relevant chapters prior to class so they can participate. The textbook for this course is only available at the bookstore.

Reading Assignment: You must read one of these books during the semester.

Democracy in America by Alexis DeToqueville Decline and Fall of the Roman Empire by Edward Gibbon The Road to Surfdom by F. A. Hayek Atlas Shrugged by Ayn Rand or The Federalist Papers by Alexander Hamilton, James Madison, John Jay, and Clinton Rossiter

Your assignment is to find and turn in ten quotes or key ideas from the book you select. Five ideas or quotes from the first half of the book are due in Lecture 12 and five quotes or ideas from the second half of the book are due in Lecture 20. This assignment must include: 1) book title, 2) author(s), 3) publisher, 4) edition, 5) and the page number for each idea or quote. If you want to get credit, you must also supply your name.

The instructor reserves the right to change the syllabus and accelerate the lectures.

Ethics Quiz: This is a series ethical problems on Sakai which you must read and analyze. The grade on this exercise is either 0 or 100. If you correctly analyze 90% or more of these ethical problems, you get 100. If you correctly analyze less than 90% you get zero. **You may take the exercise as many times as you want.** Each time you do the exercise, you may have to analyze different problems. The instructor will get your score from sakai.

Homework Assignments: Homework is detailed in the Homework Pack on Sakai. Homework for each lecture and the due dates are shown in this syllabus. The homework is designed to strengthen your understanding of the materials covered in class. Homework is collected on due dates at the beginning of class and graded on effort and punctuality. Homework that is properly done, but late will receive 90% the grade it would otherwise have. For example, homework that is 100% correct, but late will only receive a 90. Homework which is 80% correct, but late will only receive a 72. Late homework received after Thanksgiving will only receive 80% of the grade it would otherwise have. Homework not turned in will receive a zero. I CANNOT ACCEPT HOMEWORK AFTER THE LAST CLASS OR ELECTRONICALLY. SOMETIMES IN LIFE, IF YOU CAN'T COMPLETE SOMETHING BY THE DEADLINE, THERE IS NO POINT IN DOING IT. THE LAST CLASS IS ONE SUCH DEADLINE.

Group Data Mining Consulting Report - Each team must meet with me during free period to discuss this report at least a week prior to submission. I will act as the client so think about what you want to say before the meeting.

It is your responsibility to download, print and read the Saki notes. If you miss a class it is your responsibility to get class handouts from fellow students. I do not carry an inventory of handouts to subsequent classes.

Make-up exams will **not** be given except for emergencies. Social engagements do not constitute emergencies and a missed exam may receive a grade of zero.

If you have my permission to be absent from an exam, the make-up exam must be taken upon your return to class and it may or may not be the same as the exam the class took. It may be harder.

Exam Policy: You may bring one side of one sheet of 8.5" x 11" hand written notes to each exam. Anyone who asks to bring more than one side of one sheet of notes to the Final Exam will NOT be allowed to bring any notes.

Team Projects

There are two team projects. One project is a Financial Analysis of given companies. The other team project is a Data Mining consulting report.

In part, team projects are meant to re-enforce class room material through a learn-by-doing strategy. In part, team projects are meant to teach people how to organize and manage teams.

After each project, team members will evaluate all team members, including themselves. Each team member will rank team members 7, 6, 5, 4, 3, 2, or 1 with 7 as the highest and 1 as the lowest. No two people may have the same ranking. If a person contributed nothing you may give him or her zero. More than one person may receive a zero.

The team member that gets the highest ranking will receive the project grade +5 points. The team member that receives the lowest ranking will receive the project grade -5 points.

DON'T EMBARRASS YOURSELF BY SAYING THAT EVERYONE CONTRIBUTED EQUALLY.

If it were possible for everyone to contribute equally no NFL player would ever be cut from a team.

Ballots that rank two team members the same will be void. However, more than one team member may receive a zero. If there are no valid ballots for a team the entire team will receive the project grade -5 points.

The instructor will assign people to teams and reserves the right to re-organize teams after the first project.

De-Registered Students
