Course Description & Objectives: To develop an understanding of the logic and rules underlying financial reporting; to develop an understanding of the theory and concepts behind financial reporting; to learn to think analytically with respect to financial accounting information; and to communicate that information effectively. Throughout the semester, there will be class discussion on the ethical considerations and implications of accounting choices made for financial reporting.
